A message from Anita:

It is just over 80 years since Bansang Hospital was built, 200 miles deep in the West African bush. Those first 50 years of its existence were defined by ever-greater isolation, depletion and exhaustion. Half a million of the most hospitable people I've ever had the good fortune to meet almost lost their most important health facility.

Thanks to you, these last 27 years have been a most beautiful opposite. Bansang is now a vibrant, dynamic place. Its sixteen service departments have been totally overhauled – providing some of the very best facilities to be found in any public health facility in Sub-Saharan Africa. Thanks to our decade long staff retention and motivation strategy, the hospital's 400 staff are fulfilled, supported, and truly valued (helping us to reach a near 100% retention level over the last five years!).

This remarkable change simply would not have been possible if you, and others like you, hadn't decided to donate your time, money or expertise in support of this cause. In such troubled times, with so many countries turning against the idea of extending humanitarian support across borders, I am pleased Bansang can stand as a testament to the beautiful things we achieve when we stand in solidarity with those who need our help.

Turning my attention to 2019, this really has been one of those extraordinary years. Bansang is now the holder of the prestigious award for 'best hospital in The Gambia for care and services'. We are also the sole facility in the Central River Division for maternal, obstetrics, neonatal services and gender-based violence support.

Thanks to you, we've renovated the male ward, added three homes for lead medics, expanded our feeding fund for vulnerable patients/families, sent huge amounts of aid/funding, secured support for a large solar array and achieved so many things besides. We have come a very long way from the days of kerosene lamps and candles!

Yet with all that positivity, I am acutely aware that our legacy is far from secure. The devastating storms of July 2019 have forced us into costly emergency renovations of our children's ward (for which we need your support to help raise almost £21,000). We've also had to suspend the expansion of our farming project owing to the second year of low and unpredictable rains. These may just be one off events. We must plan as if they are not.

Thank you for continuing to support this special place – and for bringing hope and healing to so many wonderful people. Please continue being *the* difference.

URGENT CHRISTMAS APPEAL:

£20,558 for the final phase of the Children's Ward refurbishment



The Need:

For most of its history, the staff working on Bansang's children ward have had to contend with the most awful conditions. Four to a bed, unavoidable cross infections, acute equipment shortages and candles for lighting; this was a place where only the very strongest of children had a chance to heal. That changed in 2006 when our supporters came together to fund the new 80 bed ward.

For the last 13 years, this new ward has delivered some of the best paediatric care in West Africa. With specialist burns, malnutrition, intensive care and isolation wards, it gave every child the very best chance to survive. It was and remains a wonderful, if imperfect, achievement.

The imperfections were not our intention. Back in 2005, we were limited by the materials available to us (which the devastating storms of 2018 have shown to be dangerously inferior). We were also constrained by our understanding of how best to deliver care, particularly in relation to the control of infections such as sepsis.

Those years of learning have given us immense insight into how we can improve care for our vulnerable young patients. We now need you to help us make it a reality.

The Project:

After 13 years of analysing outcomes, we are ready to put our understanding into the complete refurbishment of the children's ward. The project has been broken into three phases. The £19,000 first phase was completed in September. The £21,735 second phase is ongoing, with the cost hopefully covered by a charitable grant. It is for the final phase, costing £20,558, that I again turn to you.

With your help, we will complete the overhaul of the Aluzinc roof (which suffered extensive storm damage). We will also fit plaster ceilings to contain heat in the roof space, along with high power fans and new LED lighting. Our focus on reducing infection will see us fit aluminium screens, metal doors, porcelain floors and elbow operable taps/toilets/showers throughout the building.

Phase 3 will also see the installation of a premature baby unit, which will complement the specialist care provided by our other wards (neonatal, ICU, malnutrition, surgical and medical). We will also be renovating our staff room, play therapy area, office and solar power facility.

This is one of our most ambitious projects to date. Please, if you have the means, help us to make it a reality

MALE WARD: Rotary donate £10,000 for refurbishment

The last time the male ward saw a throng of builders and other tradespeople was all the way back in 1938. With so many competing priorities, along with a continuing shortage of funds, wiping away those years of decay has long felt like a largely unattainable dream. I am therefore incredibly grateful to the Rotary Clubs of Brentwood à Becket, Seaford, Hadleigh Castle, Billericay, Billericay Mayflower, Kelvdon & District, and Bishops Stortford for raising £10,000 for the ward refurbishment

Their generosity (in partnership with friends of the BHA) has allowed us to overhaul the surgical/medical wards, nursing station, office, toilets, shower cubicles, along with the corridors leading to the operating theatres. The transformation was summed up rather perfectly by male ward nurse in-charge, Lamin Jarjou; "There is not a word in the dictionary that adequately describes my wonderful department, thank you doesn't seem adequate!"

SUCCESS: Bansang Hospital receives prestigious award

It also shines a deserved spotlight on the hospital's 400 strong team of medics, auxiliary staff, allied health professionals and senior management. I'd also like to pay tribute to all those who have believed and supported this cause since 1992...but who are sadly no longer here to see these successes. I will forever be grateful to them, and to you, for securing this legacy.

GREEN ENERGY: Power Up Gambia to install solar array

Sustainability has been a key focus of this charity for more than a decade. It's formed the basis of some of our largest fundraising campaigns and given us some of our biggest successes (the staff farming project for example helps feed our patients AND brings additional income). Yet there is one project that has remained agonisingly out of reach; affordable, hospital wide, solar power.

I'm therefore very pleased to announce that 'Power Up Gambia' will be returning to Bansang to fit a solar array and environmentally friendly battery bank. Unlike our previous solar efforts (which saw 24-hour solar power limited to key areas), this initiative will bring power to much of the hospital site. The scale of the array will allow us to sell power back to the grid, helping us become less dependent on outside funding for the delivery of care.

A big thank you to Power Up Gambia's director, Lynn McConville, and her team. I've seen how transformative their work has been across the country – and can't wait for Bansang to become a part of their remarkable story.

STAFF FARMING: Unpredictable rains impact expansion

Our staff farming association helped deliver a slightly increased crop yield compared to the previous year. However, in what may be a concerning indication of the new normal, our ambitions to expand onto new farming land have again been hit by unpredictable and low levels of rainfall. We have managed to temporarily offset the impact by purchasing more fertiliser but remain deeply concerned (particularly as 96% of the local community are subsistence farmers). We hope the weather patterns will normalise but are also determined to prepare as best we can for a potentially more unpredictable future.

HOUSING: Scott Bader funded project is now complete

UK chemicals company, Scott Bader, were one of the very first businesses to support this charity. More than 20 years later, their grant giving 'Commonwealth Fund' allocated us £25,000 in support of a staff housing project that would see a dilapidated building converted into homes for 3 doctors and their families. I'm thrilled to report that the project is complete, with Dr Touray, Dr Nyassi and Principle Nursing Officer Sherrifo Kanli now housed in beautiful new homes! This project forms part of our 'staff retention and motivation' strategy, which has helped achieve near 100% staff retention since 2014

CHILDREN'S WARD: Rotary help kickstart renovations

A big thank you to Rick Nunley, his Rushden Rotarians, and the wonderful ladies who prepared food at a special Italian themed fundraising evening. Their efforts were in support of first phase renovations for the children's unit which was badly damaged in the devastating storms of June 2018. Special guests on the night included Jonathan Reynolds and his son James, along with guest soprano, Maddie. The total raised from this event, as well as a 60's night hosted the previous week, was more than £2,000!

As ever, I am extremely grateful to all involved for reacting so quickly to our urgent funding request. That initial money helped us secure the damaged roof above the surgical ward and begin the renovations. The total renovation cost is £20,558 – for which we are appealing for your support. If we are successful, we will be giving our youngest patients a more capable ward, with better lighting, heat reflective ceilings and improved cooling.

SHAMBALA: UK festival makes vital contribution

We're very lucky to have long-term support from many different donors. Perhaps the most eclectic is Shambala; a sustainability orientated music/arts festival that makes a yearly pilgrimage to a beautiful country estate in my home county of Northamptonshire. As in previous years, our wonderful team of wrist-banding volunteers was headed by Victoria Rock. However, this year, the team traded wristband duties for merchandise. The team did a fabulous job under the searing August bank holiday sun, selling almost all their allotted merchandise.

Last year's donation went towards the emergency purchase and freighting of life-saving blood bags (which were in perilously short supply). A further donation of £3,450 went towards the refurbishment of our 80 bed children's unit. As ever, a huge thank you to our volunteers and to the fab Shambala management team.

NICK BRIGHOUSE: We say goodbye to a special friend

CROWD FUNDING: Innovative approach raises \$12,000

Theo and Mathilde Keller have been a continuous part of the Bansang story for more than a decade now. Their tenacity has helped galvanise the support of countless individuals and organisations in their Swiss homeland. That determination has translated into container loads of aid and pharmaceuticals being sent to Bansang; an outcome that undoubtedly helped Bansang weather the acute pharmaceutical shortages of the last few years.

The latest demonstration of their remarkable drive and fundraising ingenuity saw Theo and Mathilde using a crowd funding platform to raise an amazing \$12,000 for Bansang. The hospital's management team directed these funds towards the urgent purchase of manual and electronic blood pressure machines, heat sensitive anaesthetics and five AirSep oxygen concentrators. My thanks to Theo and Mathilde for their unwavering support, and to Gambia Experience for assisting with the freight of the blood pressure machines and anaesthetics.

LATEST: British High Commissioner visits Bansang



It was my pleasure to again welcome the British High Commissioner, Sharon Wardle, to Bansang. Her 400-mile round trip began at 7am and saw her assist with the opening of the male ward (which was filmed on national TV and attended by the regional director of health).

In recognition of her support over the years, CEO Baba Jeng invited Sharon to become an ambassador for the hospital, fitting an honorary plaque in her name. Given the BHA's ties to the UK, I am thrilled my home country has such a wonderful representative in The Gambia.

FORM NUTRITION: Feeding fund support is increased



With climate change and global inequity becoming touchstone issues in public debate, I feel lucky to be working with Form Nutrition; a UK company that is making a positive contribution in both areas. Founded by Damian Soong and Natalia Bojanic, Form Nutrition have been making quarterly contributions in support of what is now entitled the 'Form Feeding Fund'.

This initiative supports the well-being of destitute families who trek to Bansang with their sick relatives, but whom in previous years wouldn't have been able to afford to stay (resulting in them discharging their relatives early, often with tragic consequences). The support system provides counselling on arrival, along with a daily food, drug and baby formula fund (which is often a necessity for malnourished mothers).

Thanks to Form Nutrition's increasing success, including being voted as the "Best Vegan Protein Power for 2019", quarterly donations have continued to increase, with the project now extended onto the female/maternity wards. My thanks to Form Nutrition for helping assist our most vulnerable patients, whilst also making such a positive contribution to the plant-based food movement that has so much potential to protect the natural world.

PROJECT: Cemetery perimeter secured thanks to donor

Without his compassion, the Upper River Region would have been deprived of so many life enriching donations (sanitary and cleaning products, clothing, food, furniture, electrical goods and so many other things besides!). DONORS: Livingstone family support helps save lives

Two of my biggest funding requests in recent years were largely met by just one family; the Livingstone's. The 100 KVA generator that they fully funded back in 2017 is now being utilised in around 25% of life-saving procedures (including 25 caesarean sections per month). They also part funded our sewage tanker, which is now operating throughout the Upper River Division. This is helping to improve sanitation and reduce diarrhoea (which remains the eighth largest cause of mortality worldwide). I am so grateful to the Livingstone's for continuing to make such generous contributions. It is both humbling and inspiring. It also serves to remind me, especially in these troubled times, that we can all make profoundly positive impacts on the lives of those living around us.
